Tufts University researcher Richard Lerner looked at the effects of Cub Scouting on youth by comparing them to non-Scout youth over a two-and-a-half-year period. Dr. Lerner discovered that **Scouts were considerably more hopeful, obedient, cheerful, trustworthy, and reverent than their non-Scout counterparts.** He also found that Scouts were far more likely to demonstrate pro-social values like doing the right thing and helping others.

In my life, Scouting was a life-changing adventure. I learned respect for myself and others. I found terrific role models in both older Scouts and leaders. The program fostered a sense of independence as well as pride of belonging to a unit or a team. Scouting taught me to be a self-starter and to love learning. My mind was engaged and I was encouraged to work with my hands. The boys I came to rely on in Scouting are some of the best men I have ever met.

**Scouting is the best investment you can make in the lives of youth.** Scouting is a time-tested, effective program that grows **Community**, develops exceptional **Character**, and builds strong **Leadership** skills.

# **HISTORY & MISSION**

Del-Mar-Va Council has served the entire Delmarva peninsula since incorporation in 1925, originating from the Wilmington Council chartered by the National BSA in 1917. Rodney Scout Reservation - named for Delaware Revolutionary War hero Caesar Rodney - opened in 1923 on the Chesapeake Bay in Cecil County, MD. During the peak BSA membership years of the late 1950's Del-Mar-Va Council purchased

Nanticoke Scout Reservation - later renamed for Salisbury aviator Richard A. Henson - at the confluence of the Nanticoke and Marshyhope rivers in Dorchester County, MD. Due to growing demand for more centrally located Cub Scout camping facilities, a third Council property -Akridge Scout Reservation - was purchased in 2011. This site is named in honor of Easton, MD Eagle Scout John "Chip" Akridge's mother.

Del-Mar-Va Council supports more than:

**4,000** youth members

**1,250** registered volunteer leaders

**202** packs, troops, crews, ships & posts

12,000 campers served annually at our three camps

Each of these unit types is chartered to a key community partner including churches, fraternal organizations, and other community institutions. Scouting programs across the country have helped mold the character of millions of great Americans like Michael Bloomberg, Rex Tillerson, Donald Rumsfeld, Bill Gates, Steven Spielberg, Gerald Ford, Shane Victorino, and Sam Walton.

# **FUTURE VISION**

CHARACTER.

Scouting builds young adults with strong moral and ethical character.

COMMUNITY.

Scouting teaches ethics and leadership skills necessary for a productive society.

We know that Scouting today is safer than any other youth-serving organization in America. Vigorous BSA procedures including adult criminal background checks, youth protection training, and barriers-to-abuse policies have become the model for other youth-serving agencies to emulate. We also know that we need to significantly upgrade and build modern toilet and shower facilities at all of our camps to make them safer and more comfortable for all to use. With significant membership growth, primarily at the Cub Scout age level for the next several years, we will also need to dramatically increase the number and quality of Cub Scout camping facilities available to our members. We will continue to build out Akridge Scout Reservation to provide world-class, year-round camping and program opportunities, including additional lodges, pavilion, bike park, playground facilities and to improve facilities at both Rodney and Henson Scout Reservations for Cub Scouts and their families. Capital projects to improve safety and program quality expense \$6.1M.

Scouting builds strong communities where people live and work a happy and safe life. There should be Scouting programs at every elementary school. Each school should support a cub scout pack for elementary students who feed into both a Scouts BSA troop for boys, and a Scouts BSA troop for girls. Every community should have engaged chartered partners supporting these units such as churches, fraternal and veteran organization, and service clubs, that utilize the

Scouting program to extend the youth mission of their own organizations.

We will achieve this unprecedented growth with additional professional staff and volunteers working together to create over 200 new Scouting units. These units will primarily be at the elementary level. We will also improve program delivery at all program levels to increase the retention of current members. Additional operating expense to create new units and retain staff \$850,000.

We will grow the Council endowment fund to provide long-term financial stability and investment revenues to support growing operations and membership. Legacy and planned giving endowment growth \$2M.








# CAMP IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

It is necessary to renovate camp restroom facilities designed primarily for single gender programs. Camper expectations also require new facilities to meet the needs of growing family participation in Scouting programs. Camp improvements will include additional lodging facilities, swimming pool renovations, staff housing, utility upgrades, maintenance equipment, additional site pavilions, and several new program areas.
